A PROCLAMATION.

Tourth day of November in the year of Our Lord one thousand nine hundred and sixteen We did declare and proclaim that all soldiers of the Canadian Overseas Expeditionary Force absent from their units with-out leave, should be pardoned from such offence provided they surrendered themselves to the officer commanding the unit to which they belonged if that unit should be in Canada, or if it be not, to the district officer commanding any military district in Canada not later than the fifteenth day of December in the year of Our Lord one thousand nine hundred ond sixteen for the purpose of completing their engagements, and We did further by Our said Proclamation direct, declare and proclaim that those soldiers of the said Force undergoing sentence of imprisonment for desertion or absence without leave should be pardoned from such offence and released from imprisonment or detention and be handed over to the officer commanding the unit to which they belonged or to the officer commanding the military district in which they are, for the purpose of being returned to some other units of the said Expeditionary Force in order to complete their engage-

AND WHEREAS it has since become apparent that owing to existing circumstances such as the removal of the absentees to distant and out-of-the-way parts of Canada and the United States which Our said Proclamation in that behalf could not soon reach many of the absentees would not been apprised in time to enable them to surrender by the said fifteenth day of December.—

Now Know Yz that We do of Our Royal Will and Pleasure ordain, direct, declare and proclaim that the time limit for surrendering under the terms of Our said Proclamation is and shall be extended to the fifteenth day of January in the year of Our Lord one thousand nine hundred and seventeen.

Of all which Our loving subjects and all others whom these presents may concern, are hereby required to take notice and govern themselves accordingly.
